What is College? Why is college important?

## What is "College"?

- Questions for the audience: Who can define the word "college"? Who can tell us why college is beneficial?
- College can best be thought of as a place for higher learning "post-secondary school" (after high school) to help you along your career journey.
- "Go to college so that you can do something that you otherwise could not do (without college)."

### Types of *Post-Secondary* Programs

#### Four-Year College or University



Earn Bachelors and Advanced Degrees

#### **Apprenticeships**



Earn pay raises every 1,000 hours and become a journey worker for a trade.

#### Community or Junior College (2-year)



**Earn Associates and Certificates** 

#### Military



Gain experience in a variety of career fields, serve your country and earn GI Bill.

### 4-year college

- Attend a four-year colleges if:
  - ▶ Your career path requires\* a Bachelors, Masters, Doctoral or Professional degree.
  - You have 2.5GPA (weighted) and 990 SAT (minimums for non-selective colleges).
  - You are admitted to a CHANCE Program.
- Common Careers for requiring 4-year college.
  - ► Teacher, CPA, Physician, Lawyer, Airline Pilot, Engineer, Therapists, Marketing Managers, Human Resources, Actuaries, Software Developers, etc. (Use Naviance or ask a counselor about the degrees required for your field.)

\*Some careers do not require a bachelor's degree but obtaining one is helpful (IE. Police officer, Registered Nurse).

### Junior or Community College

- Attend a 2-year Community or Junior College if:
  - Your career path requires an Associates Degree or Certificate.
  - Your career path requires a Bachelors Degree but your GPA is less than 2.5 and/or SAT is less than 990. Strong academic performance allows you to "redeem" a weaker high school transcript.
  - ▶ It makes financial sense to start at a community college.\*
- Common careers for 2-year colleges.
  - ► CNC Machine Operator, Dental Hygienist, Chef, Auto/Diesel Mechanic, Sonographer, Registered Nurse, Welder, Medical Assistant, Dental Assistant, Drafter and more.

\*SOMETIMES A COMMUNITY COLLEGE START **SAVES** YOU MONEY, SOMETIMES IT **COSTS** YOU MONEY!

#### Apprenticeship Program

- Become a trade union apprentice if you wish to become:
- A laborer, pipefitter, plumber, carpenter, painter, installer, machine operators, teamster, etc.
- Apprentices are "workers who learn" and earn a good hourly wage. Pay increases occur every 1,000 hours. Journey workers typically earn \$60,000 \$90,000/year with opportunity to earn higher wages as mangers, superintendents and business owners.
- The classroom education component is free.
- Must be willing and able to travel to worksites.
- Must make wise decisions and be on-time. Many unions cut people for failing drug/alcohol tests.

### Military

- Enlist or become an officer if you wish to serve your country as a Soldier, Marine, Airman or Sailor. MANY different careers in the military are available.
- To enlist active duty or reserves, contact a recruiter (they visit the cafeteria often).
- To become an officer, apply to an academy or apply to a college ROTC program.
- Note: Students can receive large amounts of financial aid via the GI Bill.

#### Timeline and Application Process

#### 4-year college

- Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) after October 1<sup>st</sup> and before November 15<sup>th</sup> to ensure eligibility for grants.
- Application deadlines vary, the earliest priority deadline is November 1<sup>st</sup>.
- Complete FAFSA "verification" when requested.
- Receive financial aid letters from December through April.
- Decision Day is May 1st (check with your college of choice to see if this is a hard deadline).
- Make initial deposit at time of comital.

#### 2-year College

- Admissions is "open enrollment".
- Follow Financial Aid Steps listed under 4-year College
- Complete the New Student Enrollment form by end of November to be eligible for the Foundation Scholarships (due January 15<sup>th</sup>).
- Complete all enrollment steps prior to May 1<sup>st</sup> for priority course selection

#### Timeline and Application Process cont.

#### Apprenticeship Programs

- Applications open throughout the year for students 18 and older.
- Apply to the correct local (based on where you live).
- For more information, visit cisco.org.

#### Military

- To enlist, check in with local recruiters for the application process.
- To apply to an academy...hopefully you already started the process (requires congressional recommendations).
- To apply to an ROTC program, follow the college's application deadlines.

#### Institutional Aid

Some colleges offer need-based grants (or meet 100% of need as determined by the FAFSA or as determined by an institutional aid form for undocumented students.)

Some colleges allow you to compete for full-ride scholarships.

Most colleges (NOT ALL) provide scholarships based on your GPA and SAT Scores. These are called **merit scholarships**.

#### **Private Aid**

- Private aid is earned by filing out scholarship applications and sending them to the company, organization or person offering them.
  - You might work for an employer that offers scholarships. Ask!
- Awards can range from \$200 to full-rides.
- Most require a student to come from a low-income household.
- Community service, school involvement and writing ability help.
- Generally high GPAs and SAT scores help, but there are some exceptions.

- ► Go to Naviance -> College Tab -> Scholarships and Money -> Scholarship List
- Naviance will either have a website to visit or a .pdf to print out for applications.

#### Government (Federal) Aid


- By completing the FAFSA (October!) you may qualify for need-based grants (up to \$12,000/year) & work study (up to \$3,000/year)
- All qualify for loans (\$5,500 \$7,500/year).
- We will host a FAFSA workshop for families on Monday, October 7<sup>th</sup> from 5:30pm-7:30 in the College and Career Center and ISAC is here every Tuesday and Thursday during lunch/study hall hours (in the CCC).
- ▶ Undocumented students may now qualify for the MAP Grant (worth \$5,300/year) due to the RISE ACT. More information will follow. Applications will be open after January 1<sup>st</sup>.




#### Naviance eDocs

- Requesting Letters of Recommendation
  - ► Have a conversation with your teacher/counselor **FIRST**
  - Allow at least a week before the due date
  - ▶ If necessary, complete a Teacher Recommendation Request Form
  - Make the request through Naviance:
    - Colleges I'm Applying To
    - ► Letters of Recommendations
    - Add Request
    - Select a Teacher or Counselor
    - Select "all future and current colleges"


#### How to add schools




#### How to add schools




## Adding Schools & Requesting Transcripts



#### Common App

- ► IF you want to apply to multiple schools on the Common Application and/or you are applying to a school that makes you use the Common App, you must create a Common App account and link it to Naviance.
- ▶ Go to: Commonapp.org
- Fill out the application, add schools, waive FERPA. All letters of recommendation requisitions must be done on NAVIANCE. DO NOT request writers through the Common App.
