Arts and Communication

The Creative Path

This cluster offers two different avenues of concentration:

- Careers in the Performing Arts or Visual Arts
- Certain Aspects of Journalism, Broadcasting Film require courses and activities that challenge students' creative talents.



Business, Management and Technology



The Business Path

This path prepares students for careers in planning, organizing, directing and evaluating business functions essential to efficient and productive business operations.



Health Services

The Health Path

This path prepares students to promote health, wellness, and diagnosis as well as treat injuries and diseases. Some of the careers involve directly working with people, while other involve research into diseases or collecting and formatting data and information.



Human Services



The Helping Path

This path prepares individuals for employment in careers that relate to families and human needs such as counselor and mental health services, family and community services, personal care and consumer services.



Industrial and Engineering Technology

The Building and Fixing Path

Careers in this pathway of study are related to the technologies necessary to design, develop, install or maintain physical manufacturing systems. These may include engineering and related fields, architecture, mechanics and repairers, manufacturing technology, precision production, electrons and construction trades and related industries.



Natural Resources Agriculture

The Nature Path

Careers in this path will involve planning, managing, and performing agricultural production, horticulture and landscaping services, and related professional and technical services; planning, managing, and performing mining and extraction operations; managing and conserving natural resources; and performing related environmental services.
